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Introduction

The Water and Sanitation for Health (WASH) Project is pleased to issue this bibliography of over four hundred items selected from its library that contain important information of both a theoretical and practical nature on community and women's participation in water supply and sanitation in developing countries. This information should be of great value to those planning and managing water supply and sanitation programs since experience has demonstrated the critical relationship of the participation of communities-- and particularly that of women--to the success of these programs. A careful reading of the references cited in this bibliography should lead the reader to the same conclusion.

This bibliography is intended primarily for use by AID project managers, their contractors, and their host country counterparts in project planning and monitoring. Others who may find it useful include those having similar responsibilities in other agencies, as well as teachers, researchers and students.

Of particular help in the compilation of the bibliography was the annotated bibliography prepared by the International Reference Centre in 1979.* Many of the entries in this bibliography are based on information given in the IRC publication. Since the IRC summaries provide excellent detail, the IRC reference number is included here. Major sources of entries are the personal libraries of Drs. Mary Elmendorf and Raymond B. Isely. The initial organization of these materials was accomplished with the help of Ms. Ellen Lieber of CARE. It is these entries that give the bibliography its unique character. Because of this unique character and the unique audience to which the bibliography is addressed, it is viewed as complementing rather than replacing the IRC bibliography.

This bibliography is presented in three parts. In the first part, the author index, entries are arranged alphabetically by author and are numbered sequentially. They include codes (attached) identifying subject, phase of project, and type of document as well as country or region, if applicable. In the second part of the bibliography, entries are arranged according to subject. In the third part, numbers referring to items in the author index are presented by country or region. From both the subject and country/region indexes, readers may access the fully coded citation by referring back to the numbered entry in the author index.

Readers are urged to submit relevant additional titles to the WASH Project for inclusion in subsequent editions. Meanwhile, it is hoped the document will find a useful role in program planning, implementation, and evaluation.
